Explain the business – What does this company do?

Kalamazoo County Sheriff's Office is a Police department that oversees all of Kalamazoo County. They provide assistance to anyone in trouble. If there is a disturbance they get called out, Or if the need to take someone into jail. Another part of their job is to stop anyone violating the traffic policies and give tickets to those people.

2. What was the first thing you noticed when you arrived (about the facility, people, dress code, etc.)?

The first thing I noticed when I arrived was that there were about 6 or 7 people woking from out of that office for the day. They were all wearing their normal clothes at first and changed into their work stuff and grabbed anything they needed out of their lockers. They usually sit and joke aorund with each other for about 30 minutes before they split up and go on their own. Everyone their seemed like they were close friends, and it was an enjoyable experience to be around all the workers.

3. What does a typical day look like for the person you shadowed?

a. Hours?

He has a weird schedule. Mr. Cattell has 12 hour shifts from 7am to 7pm. He works 3 days and has 3 days off, then he works 2 days and has 2 days off and it repeats itself over and over.

b. Job Duties/Tasks?

He is a patrol officer so he has his own car that he gets into every morning and drives it all day. He patrols Texas Township and enforces any laws that he deems necessary. Sometimes he takes calls and goes to help people and other times it is just sitting around checking for traffic violations.

c. Meetings?

Every morning they have a daily briefing to get any necessary information, but mostly it's just them mainly joking around and talking for about 30 minutes. They also have field training meetings and township meetings once or twice a month.

d. Work Environment?

He mainly just works out of his patrol car because it has all the tools he needs. There is a radio, a printer, a computer, and anything else he may need throughout the day. Sometimes the day goes really quickly if it's busy and other times it can be very boring and slow.

They interact with many people. There are other patrol officers that they see every morning and sometimes help each other out with calls during the day. There are many public citizens that they have to interact with. Helping people in danger, and enforcing the law.
